Secret evidence could , shatter his defense

A startling photo taken by a Russian spy satellite could destroy O.J. Simpson's alibi — and help prove he's a murderer!

The high-tech snooping device snapped the picture from outer space as it passed over O.J.'s home at the time prosecutors say Nicole Simpson

and Ron Goldman were slain.

The photo shows that O.J.'s Ford Bronco is not parked outside his estate and that's a blow to the defense claims the vehicle was there and O.J. was

home.

Prosecutors in the O.J. trial obtained the amazing snapshot from the Russians in the past month with the help of the U.S. State Department, The EN-QURRER has learned.

"The prosecutors feel the photo is important new evidence," said a source.

The Russians also helped identify the time the photo was snapped and

passed that along to authorities. "The prosecution claims the photo was taken very close to 10:30 p.m. on June 12, 1994, which fits into the time they say the murders were commit-ted," the source said.
